From Roots To Fruits: The Tree Of VCFSE Life

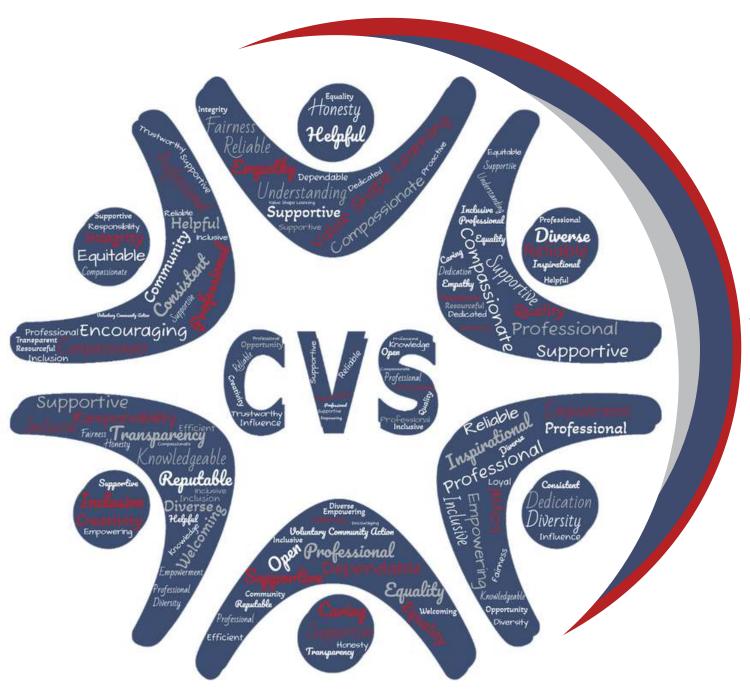

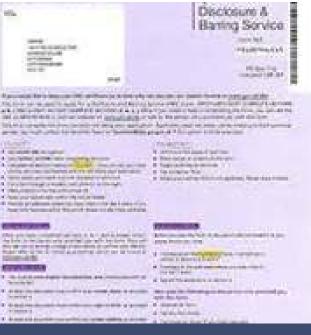

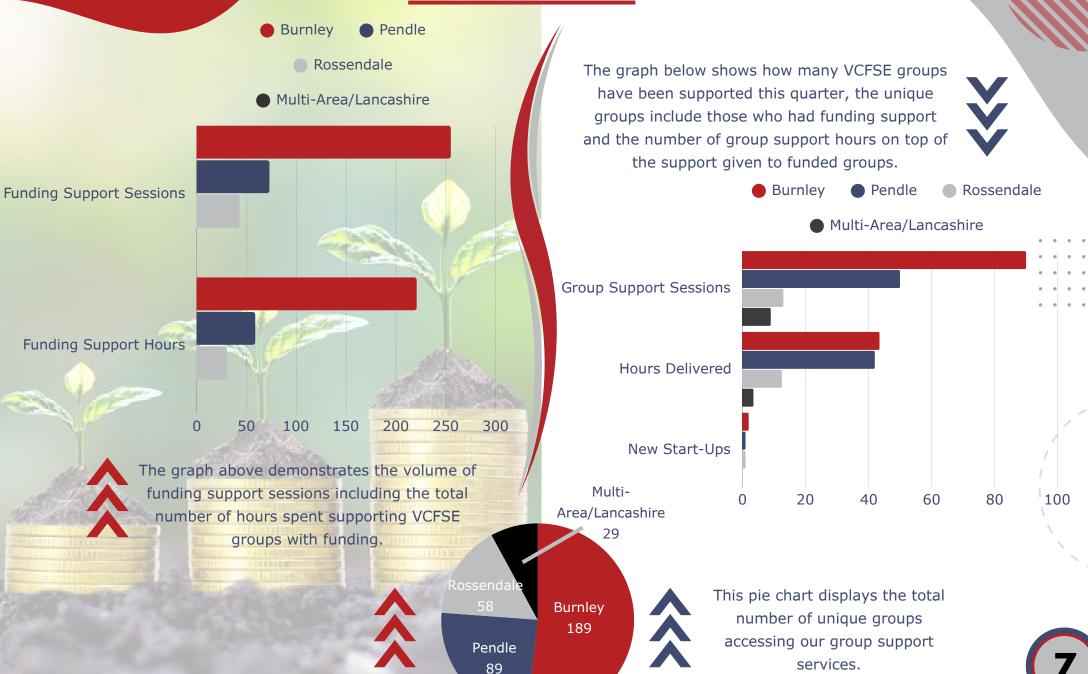

365 groups have received support this quarter - that's an average of **121+** groups every month!

371 sessions of funding support given to groups this quarter - that's equal to **123+** sessions of funding support delivered each month!

59 DBS enquiries were received which resulted in the team processing **71** DBS applications.

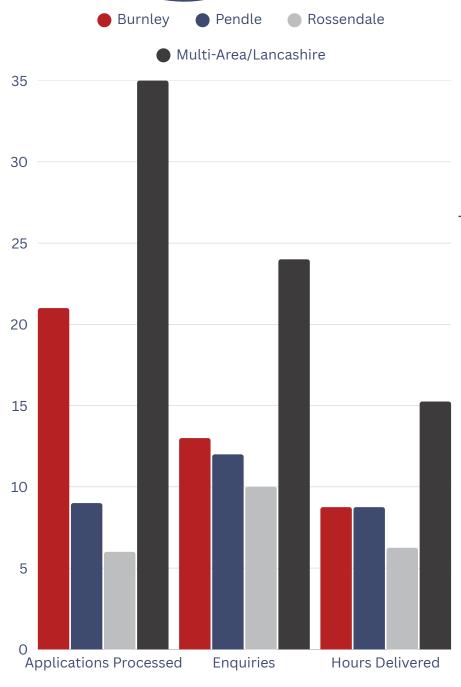

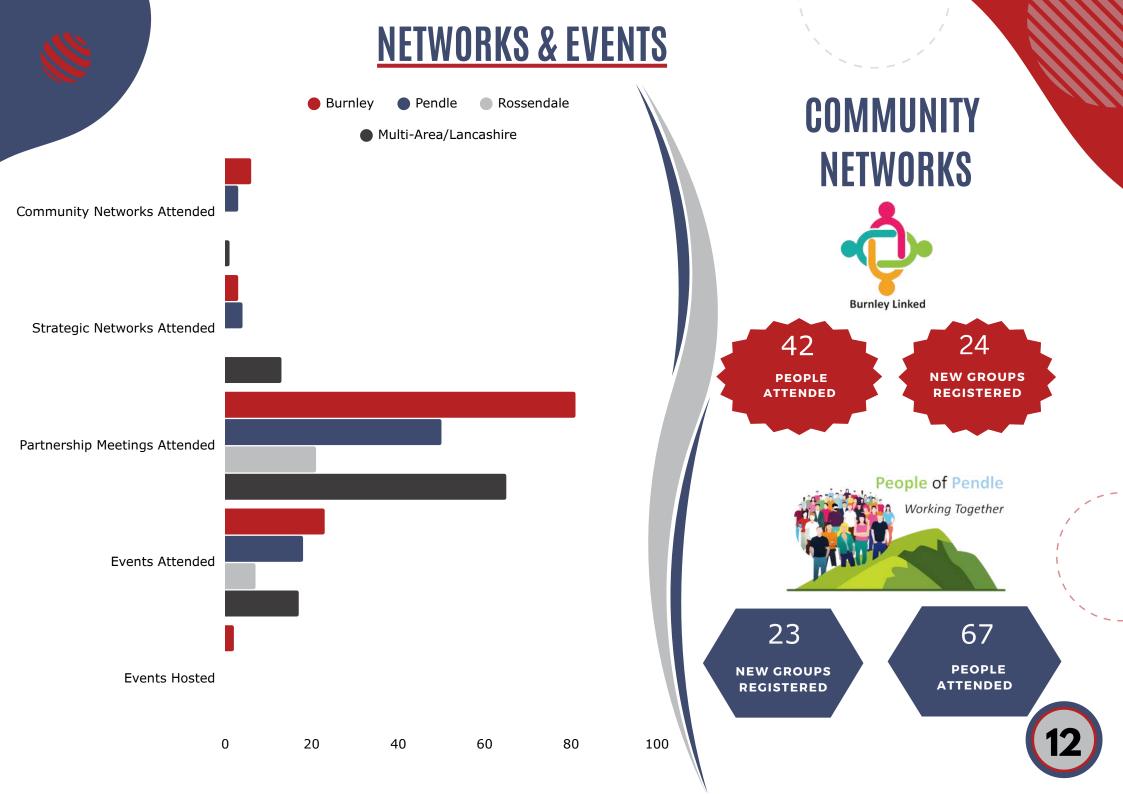

The Social Prescribing Team has 16 members of staff comprising an Operations Manager, Team Manager and Project Support.

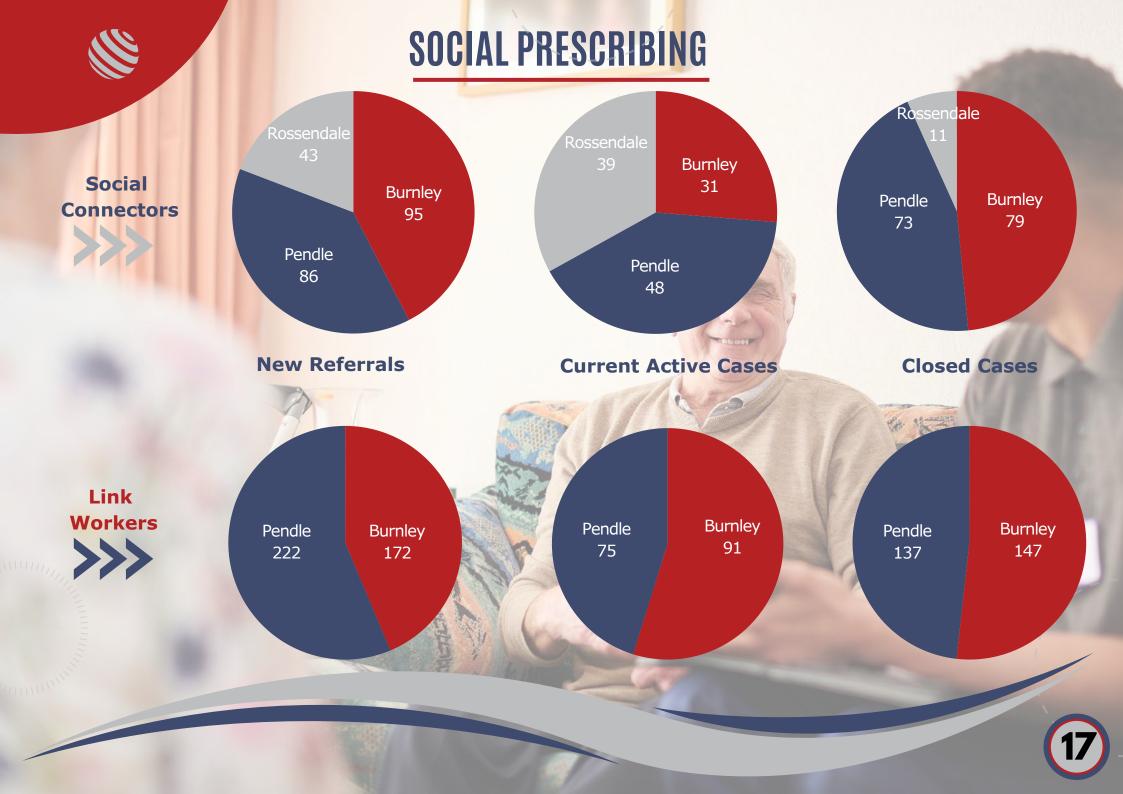
We have 6 full time and 6 part time Social Prescribing Link Workers (SPLWs) & Social Connectors.

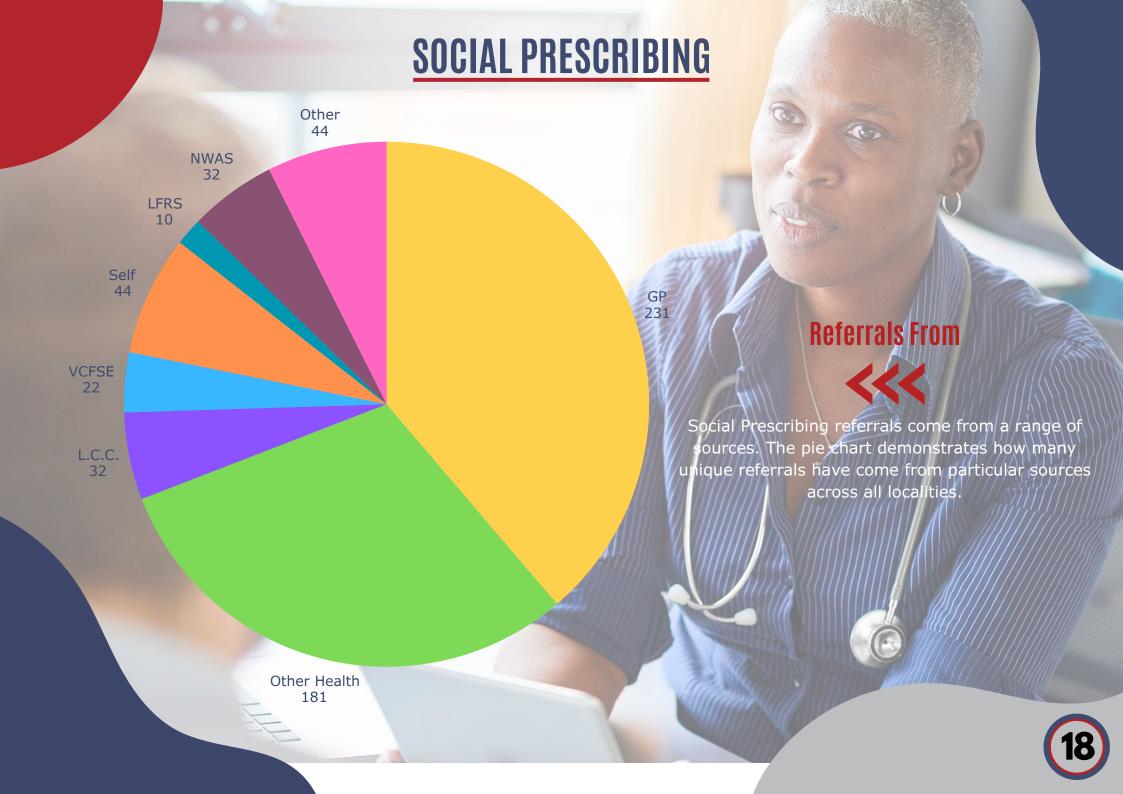
Each locality team are meeting and integrating well with health care professionals as part of the PCN process.

Co-location of Health and Wellbeing Teams is now being considered across all areas due to the successful integration of the SPLWs with Integrated Neighbourhood Teams and other healthcare teams in some areas.

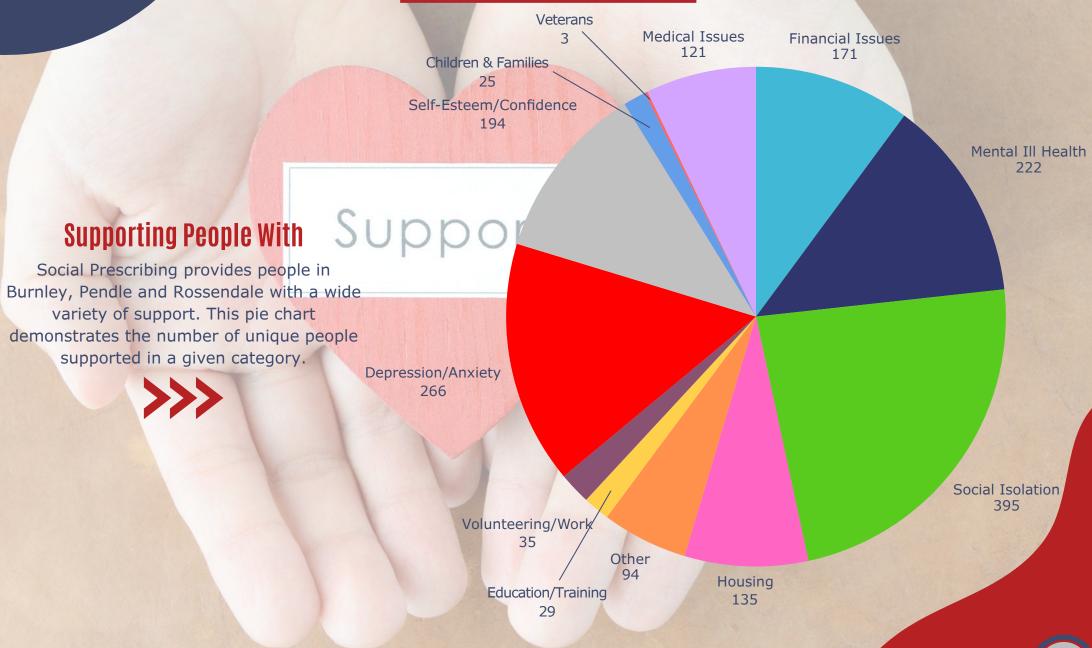
Cases are increasingly complex - the cost-of-living crisis is impacting on our communities and so increasing referrals substantially. BPRCVS' Chief Officer continues to be the voice of the sector on a local, regional and county level as a trustee of NAVCA (National Association of Voluntary and Community Action).

Teams are regularly engaging with the community at various events, which is proving successful in building relationships with other services and raising community awareness of the service available.

SOCIAL PRESCRIBING CASE STUDY

Housing Situation Affecting Mental Health

Reasons Indicated On Initial Referral

Mental health and housing.

Background Of Client

43 year old male.

Initial Assessment, Findings & Support Provided

Client lives in a HMO and is struggling there. He has a bwithus account and is in the correct band. He has sought advice from Shelter, but doesn't feel he is getting anywhere. His housing situation is impacting his mental health. The client has referred himself for therapy and is on a waiting list. He is currently out of work due to mental health, doesn't know if he is in receipt of the correct benefits, and is struggling to make ends meet.

Client Outcomes

Housing - explained banding/bidding process regarding bwithus to the client as he was unsure. Provided information on the following via email: contact number for Housing Needs at the Council. Drop in information for Shelter for general advice at Church on The Street. Information regarding bond scheme and DHP through the Council for purpose of funding private rent fees, so he can look into private renting alongside bwithus.

Finances - information emailed on the following: Citizens Advice drop ins for benefits, energy and debt advice. Link to the Household Support Fund for financial support with food and energy costs. Information for the Community Grocery for access to surplus supplies.

Mental health - Explored social inclusion to support wellbeing which the client agreed would help. Sent information via email on several different social groups and activities such as exercise, outdoor-based activities, music-based, and others to which the client is attending independently.

Client Comments

"Thanks for all the information, not least of which your insights re applications for social housing.

And also thank you for your patience on the phone, you were warm and helpful, and I feel much less daunted by everything now than i was before. I know it's your job, but it meant a lot. So thank you."









ADULT SOCIAL CARE

Adult Social Care is a new project funded by Lancashire County Council who send us the referrals directly.

The team consists of 3 workers; one in Burnley, one in Pendle, and one in Rossendale.

The project aims to utilise a model similar to that of Social Prescribing, but in an adult social care context.

The team provides support to people by linking them to activities and opportunities within the VCF (voluntary, community and faith) sector to address their non-medical needs.

By supporting residents in Lancashire to maintain their independence, social inclusion, and connection to their communities, we aim to improve their wellbeing.

SOCIAL PRESCRIBING FOR CHILDREN & YOUNG PEOPLE

Our Health & Wellbeing for Children & Families project was paused in the summer of 2024 due to funding running out. BPRCVS is hopeful of securing more funding to recommence the delivery of this project in 2025.

We continue to support children and young people through a pilot Social Prescribing project in the Pendle West PCN area.

Social Prescribing for children and young people is no different to Social Prescribing for adults. We operate in virtually the same way with the only real difference being the focus is put upon the health and wellbeing of the child or young person. We look to improve health and wellbeing via non-clinical, community services.

We continue to work with parents and guardians, and schools to ensure a comprehensive program of support addressing their needs is fulfilled.

SOCIAL PRESCRIBING FOR CHILDREN & YOUNG PEOPLE CASE STUDY

Activities At Easter & In May 2025

The Social Prescribing for Children & Young People team have been busy delivering a range of activities for the children and young people to get stuck into.

Outdoor Adventures at Pennine Oaks involved fishing, meditation and arts and crafts. A Day At The Allotment with The Deen Centre & Sarah A Arts involved planting and weeding, observational pencil sketching, oil pastel rubbings, and natural resource themed water-based printmaking and stamps. We took the children and young people to Lazer Fazer at Giddy Kippers, and Clip 'n' Climb at the Leisure Box too with some braving the Leap of Faith!

To make attendance easier for the children and young people we arranged minibus transport using the BPRCVS Community Transport Minibus.

All the children and young people in attendance had a wonderful time at these activities, and got stuck right in. Most of them don't have the opportunity to participate in activities like this, so it's a vitally important part of the service to enable them to engage with new people, learn new skills, try new activities, and have a bit of fun. Activities like this have proven to improve the health and wellbeing of the children and young people.

During the summer of 2025 there's a load more activities planned too.









COMMUNITY TRANSPORT



Communicars is a community transport service delivered by BPRCVS for the people of Burnley, Pendle, and Rossendale. The service is reliant on volunteer drivers who use their own cars to transport passengers. The service helps the socially isolated, disabled and elderly get to groups, lunch clubs, trips into town, and so much more.

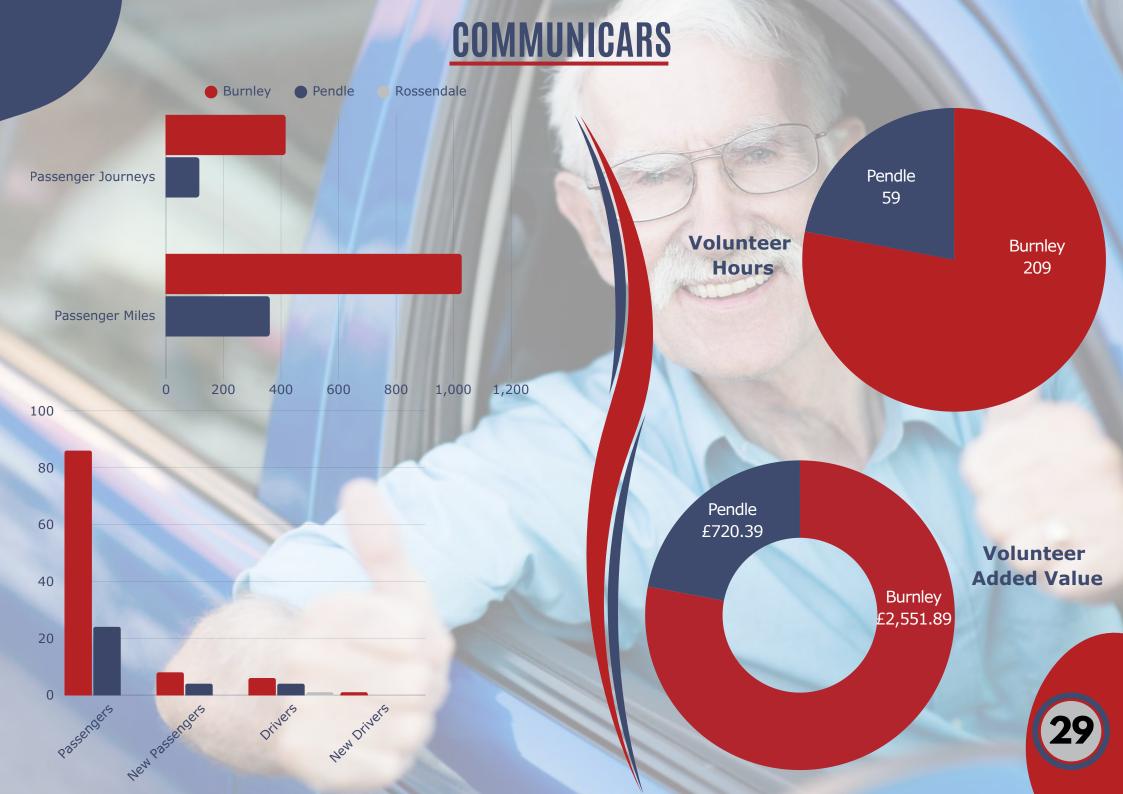
The service currently supports **110** active passengers, and completed **532** journeys covering **1,389** miles.

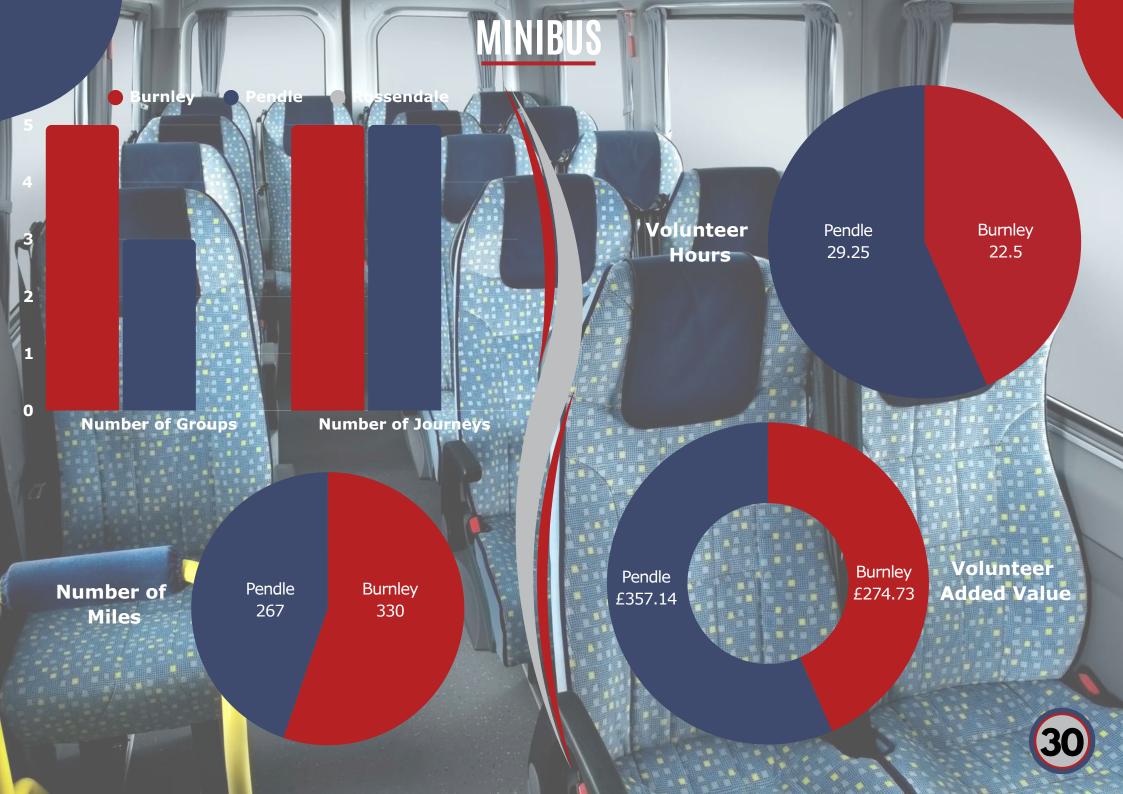


The minibus is driven by volunteer drivers and is available for hire by any of the VCFSE groups and organisations in Burnley, Pendle and Rossendale.

The day trips from Gannow Community Centre have restarted and have proved to be very popular.

8 groups have accessed the minibus this quarter for a total of **10** trips covering **597** miles.





COMMUNITY TRANSPORT CASE STUDY

Gannow Community Centre Trips

Gannow Community Centre have monthly trips to various locations for a reasonable price which is available for people in the local community.

The purpose of these trips is to help local people reduce their social isolation and get out and about to venues and locations they otherwise would struggle to get to. By operating at break even we make these trips extremely affordable in comparison to other local tour operators.

In May we went to Bury Market.

Here's what some of the passengers had to say about their day trip out...

"I thought it was a smashing trip overall to Bury Market. It was well organised too, also we had a very careful and thoughtful driver. It was a good price."

BPRCVS supports residents of Burnley to develop their employability possibilities, from help with CV writing, small business set up support, confidence building, volunteering, interview skills development or helping to work on barriers into employment.

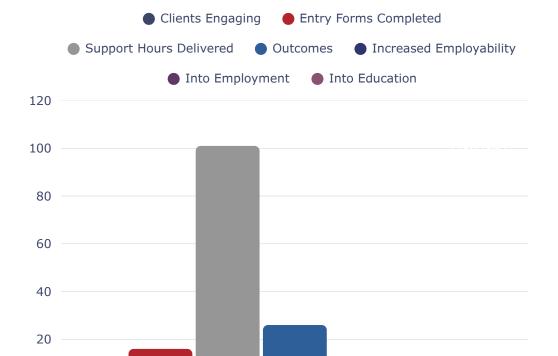
We offer supported training and work alongside our partners offering a holistic approach to move our residents forward.

The project is open to anyone unemployed age 16+. We have specialist drop ins for over 50s, women, under 24s and BAME, as well as a track record of helping long term disabled back into employment.

This project is funded by the UK Government through the UK Shared Prosperity Fund.



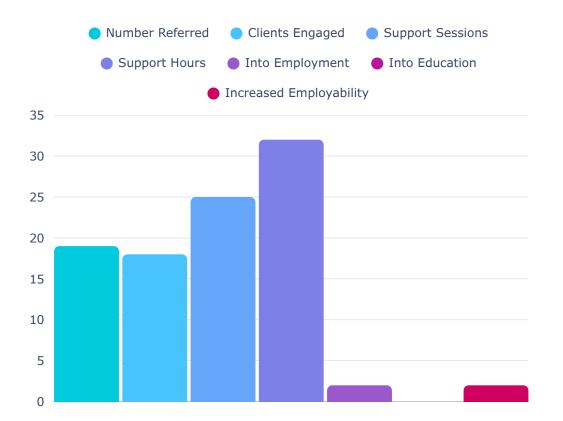
UKSPF Steps Into Employment



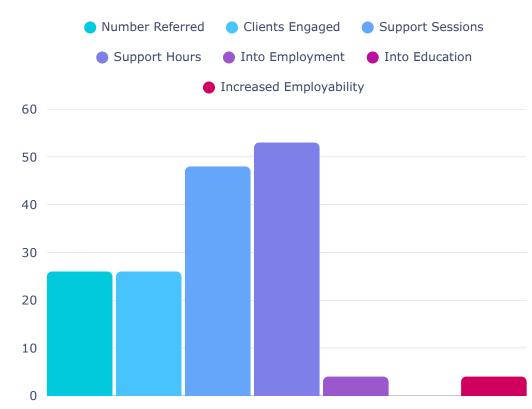

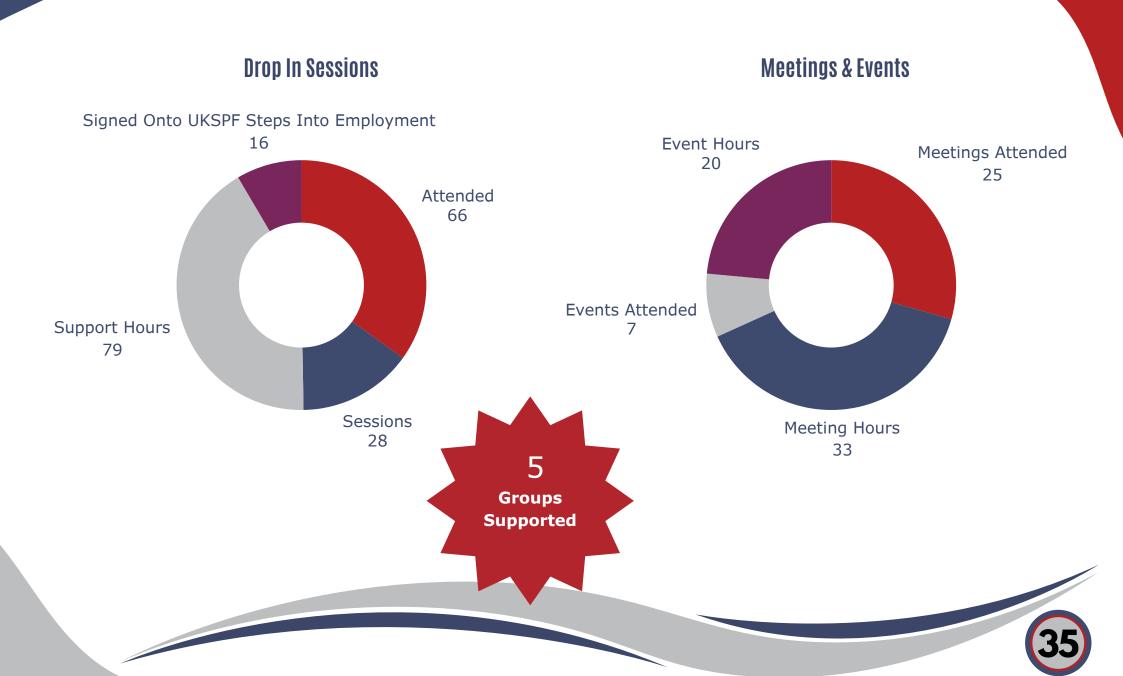


Women Into Employment Agenda

EMPLOYMENT SUPPORT CASE STUDY

Transforming Lives & Futures

Our client came to us via our drop in at the Rosegrove Community Hub. He has struggled with his mental health for several years and was feeling he did not know which direction to go in. He has been a carer for his step mum for several years, and felt a bit lost and left behind. His friends were all working and moving on with their lives, getting their own flats, and going out.

He came to us as he felt totally lost, no idea of his next steps, with no help through the JobCentre as he is economically inactive (carer), and not knowing who he could talk to about it. He saw our advert through a flyer we had in a shop in Rosegrove.

He has an ambition of being a paid carer in a space where he potentially would have a mixed clientele. He doesn't have any formal qualifications in this. He was successful at first interview and went on the Dovestone Gardens training project. After his placement he was interviewed for a role at Dovestone as a care assistant, he was successful and starts his job in June 2025.

He feels that this was an amazing opportunity; one he previously would not have done due to his confidence and anxiety. He now feels much more confident, this shows in his ability to talk to people, starting conversations, and how his appearance has changed. He now has a reason to shave and have a haircut he told us.

We looked at getting him into volunteering in his local area, helping locals with their gardens. He really enjoyed this, and it made him more determined to work in a sector where he can help people. He also started attending more social events at the local hub. He now spends more time with his parents and feels more connected to them.

He is also looking to move into his own place by Christmas. He has ambition now and he is looking at his long-term future with confidence. He feels with the support this project has given him alongside his placement it has transformed his life and his future. He feels he can go forwards and become the care assistant he really wants to be. He has discussed with them continuing 'on the job training', and his interview feedback was he was exactly what they were looking for and he has a bright future ahead of him.

LACVS VOLUNTEERING FOR HEALTH

Volunteering for Health is a Lancashire footprint project with LAVCS working in partnership with NHS Charities Together and NHS England.

The project is looking to develop a Vision for Volunteering for Lancashire and put in place a tool kit for VIOs which is accessible to all (including training, policies, processes, digital dashboard).

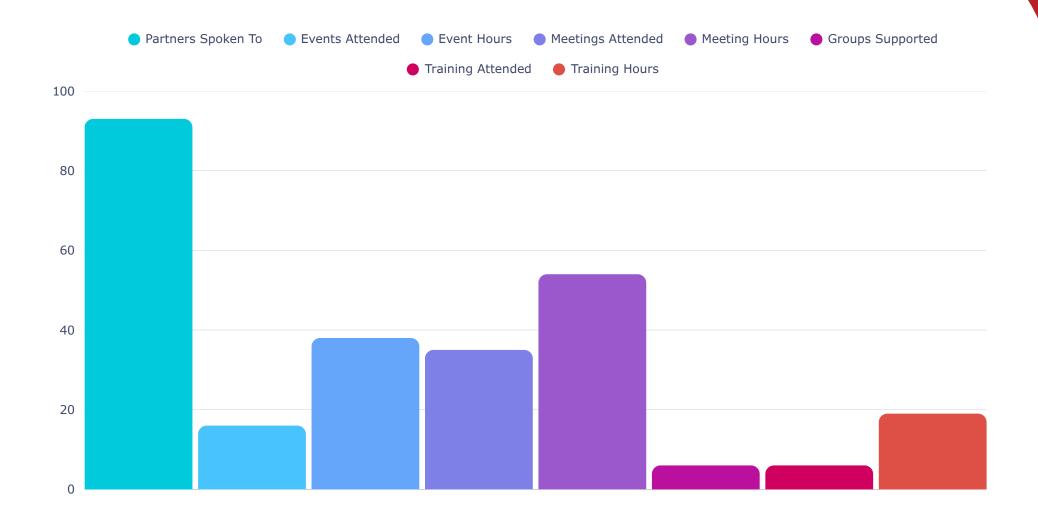
We are working at national level to influence the policy environment and increase our understanding of the impact of volunteers and volunteering across the NHS with monthly national learning days to discuss strategy, and a newly founded Lancashire 12 Place Based Partnership involving the ICB, Local Authority, Teaching Hospitals, VCFSE Sector and Volunteer network representatives who oversee the district as a whole.

The aim is to look at the need of the area, and develop and deliver within volunteering in the local integrated care system into the community via the 10-year plan.

Also tasked with establishing new partnerships to share volunteer policies, processes and relationships, a dedicated Volunteer Managers Forum which will be open to anyone involved in the volunteer agenda in Lancashire at a place-based local level, meeting monthly, helping to create a clear and concise volunteer voice to drive forward volunteering in Lancashire.

The Volunteering for Wellbeing & Community Hub is a brand-new project funded by the National Lottery Community Fund which began in July 2023. BPRCVS is revitalising volunteering in Burnley, Pendle and Rossendale.

Whether you're an individual looking for voluntary opportunities or a VCFSE group or organisation looking to recruit volunteers, we can help.

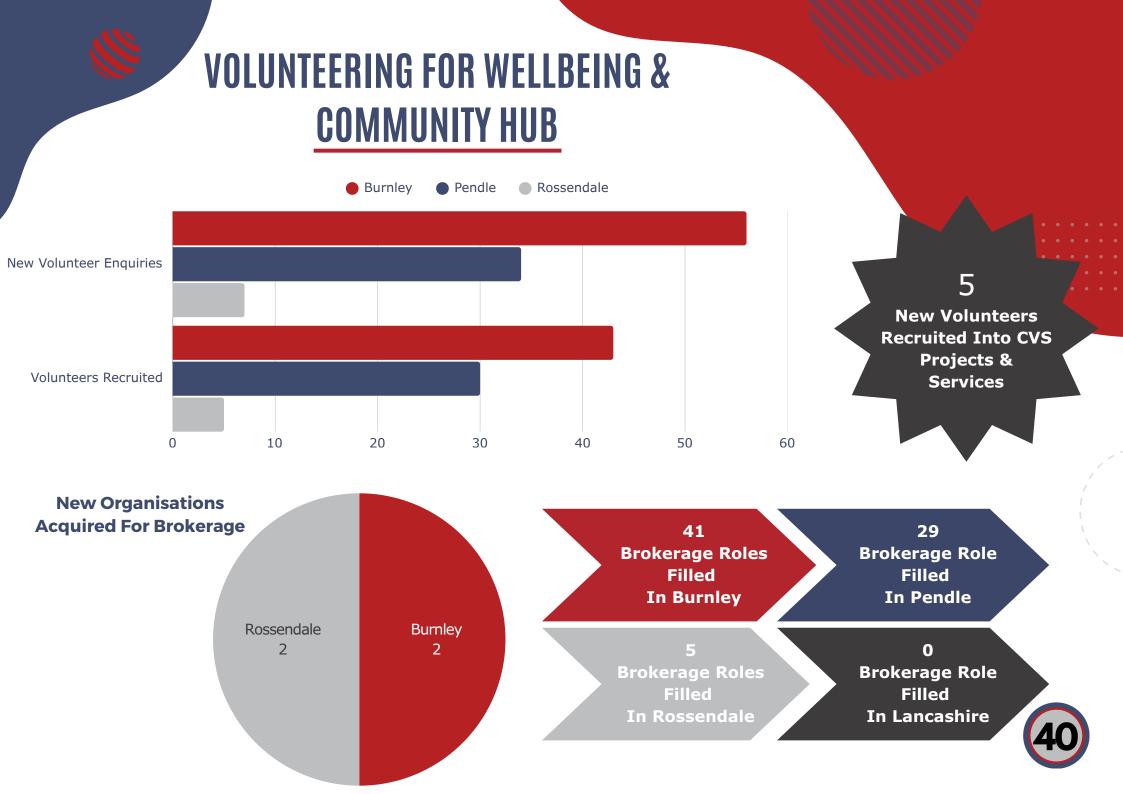

The Hub has supported **4** new VCFSE groups via our brokerage service.

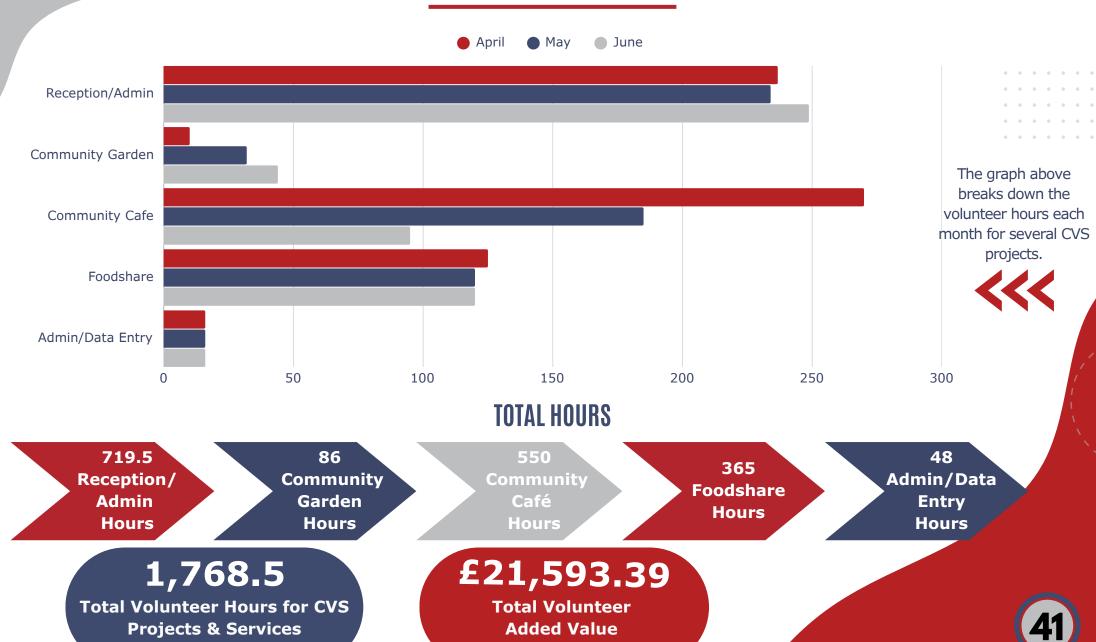

Volunteering At BPRCVS Leads To Employment

I applied to become a volunteer with BPRCVS in August 2024.

Due to various personal circumstances I hadn't worked for any significant length of time in the last two years. As a result of this I had very little confidence, both in myself and my ability to undertake an administrative role.

I noticed that BPRCVS were looking for a Volunteer Receptionist and successfully applied for the position.

I can very honestly say that it has been the best thing that I have ever done.

I completed a series of online training modules (including Data Protection and Safeguarding), and spent some time shadowing one of the experienced volunteers. After that, I felt that I was able to undertake the role on my own, with support available if and when I needed it.

Everyone has been extremely friendly and very helpful and supportive to me at all times. I have gained a great deal of confidence, both in dealing with visitors to the building and carrying out general administrative duties, as well as speaking to a wide range of people over the telephone.

As a result of this and my increased levels of confidence, I have managed to obtain full-time paid employment in an administrative role.

UK Shared Prosperity Fund

The UK Shared Prosperity Three Year Programme came to an end in March. The first overview report was submitted to BBC. A full and final narrative with case studies and programme findings will be due by 27 June.

A fourth year of funding has been confirmed. There are changes to criteria and priorities. As soon as these are confirmed, the application pack will be updated and we will be able to launch the programme. We are awaiting confirmation on expected date for receiving the money.



Lancashire & South Cumbria Integrated Care Board

The ICB funding finished in March. The final report is due imminently.

A new year's funding is confirmed. We are waiting for the money to be paid and will launch the fund as soon as the application pack is completed.

Eric Wright Charitable Trust Fund

The Large Grants programme is ongoing. The money has all been allocated. Projects and spend will complete by August.

The Small Grants Programme has been confirmed. We have received the funding and launched to the wider community. Application packs have been sent out and we have confirmed our first application for funding.



Community Cohesion and Resilience Programme

Two streams of funding have been allocated from Burnley Borough Council and Pendle Borough Council. Both are now fully awarded to projects. Burnley have 13 successful applicants and Pendle have 10 successful applicants. The funding is a short turn-around with completion and reports due in summer.



Grants of between £500 to £5,000 available for (at least) constituted community groups, and local organisations with an annual turnover of less than £300,000 within the voluntary, community and faith (VCF) sector.

Projects will bring together communities from different backgrounds, faiths and cultures. They will build, improve and strengthen local partnerships supporting community resilience. Projects will improve communities' capabilities to tackle extremism narratives and ideologies, and promote unity and shared values.

Free workshops on conflict resolution, tackling extremist narratives and improving the capability of schools to respond to community tensions is also being offered to schools in the target areas.





FUNDING CASE STUDY

Phoenix Riding for the Disabled Association

Learn and Ride Together

UK Shared Prosperity Community Grants - Awarded £19,000.00

Phoenix RDA, a volunteer-led organisation based in Burnley, provided riding lessons and equine therapy to children and adults with disabilities.

Operating over 50 sessions weekly, they worked closely with specialist schools and home-schooled individuals to build confidence and trust through horse interaction.

With capital funding, the group purchased essential equipment including helmets, grooming kits, barrows, shovels, and games materials. This ensured compliance with British safety standards, improved the quality of horse care sessions, and enhanced the engagement of indoor riding activities. The new resources allowed each group to work independently without sharing tools, making sessions more efficient and enjoyable. The funding also enabled the addition of a weekly session for a local specialist school, allowing different groups of children to earn Level 1 certificates in horse care and riding, with the opportunity to progress to Level 2. The equipment supported both riders and coaches, making sessions more dynamic and accessible.

The equipment has made such a difference to the sessions, and the riders love them.

Case Study Background: A 15-year-old with cerebral palsy and hemiplegia, unable to weight bear, was referred to the programme. His family was advised that riding could help improve his core strength.

Needs: He required support to develop core strength, balance, and coordination, and to build confidence in physically demanding activities.

Actions Taken: A dedicated team supported him during sessions, using a hoist for mounting and providing side-walkers and a leader. Activities were tailored to improve posture and coordination, including games like letterbox posting, flag placement, and basketball, all designed to be fun and engaging.

Outcomes: Initially unable to sit upright, he progressed to maintaining an upright position throughout sessions with minimal correction. His gait improved, and his legs became less stiff, much to his family's delight.

Comment from participant: "Basketball on Flossie is awesome."

Case Study Background: A 17-year-old volunteer and trainee coach, who began volunteering with his grandmother, continued after her passing.

He experienced anxiety and found comfort working with horses.

Needs: He needed support to continue his coaching development and build confidence in his abilities.

Actions Taken: He assisted with pony care and began planning and delivering riding sessions under supervision. The use of equipment like flags and cones helped him design engaging activities.

Outcomes: His confidence grew significantly, both socially and in his coaching skills. He expressed pride in helping others and looked forward to becoming a qualified instructor.

Comment from Volunteer: "Helping disabled people to ride like I can is just ace! It would not have been possible without Phoenix RDA and their encouragement."

MEDIA & COMMUNICATIONS

The Media & Communications team is responsible for promoting BPRCVS and our projects and services across a variety of channels. The team also does this for VCFSE groups and organisations to help spread the word on their behalf.

The BPRCVS website is an information sharing portal similar where we publish a wide range of information relating not just to BPRCVS, but also all the groups and organisations across our localities and beyond that we engage with. Watch this space as we're always looking to develop the website to contain even more information than before!

Social media performance continues to be impressive. We've amassed more than **2,700** organic 'Likes' on Facebook and a total greater than **6,200** unique 'followers' across our channels. Distinct audiences are forming across our social media channels enabling us to target specific demographics. We're moving away from X, but still tweeting occasionally. However, we're now on Instagram so come and join us there!

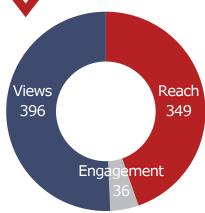

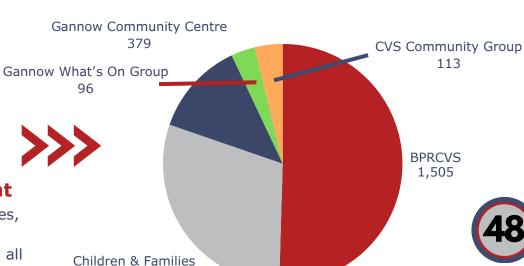

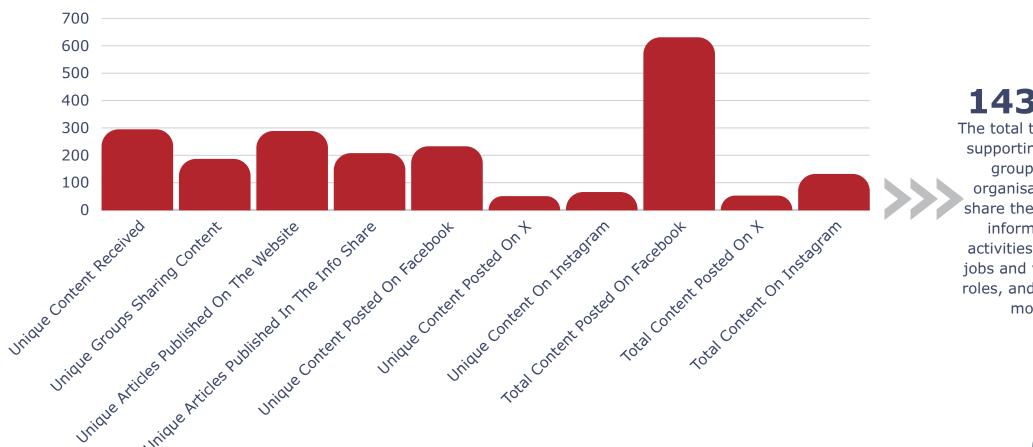

The Gannow Food Share supports individuals and families with access to food bags to provide sustenance for a few days.



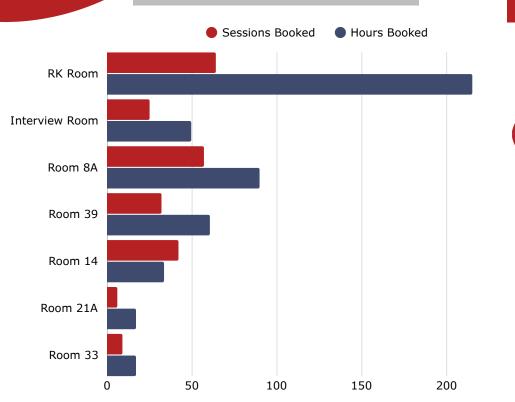
